March 7, 1935 Breda Loses In Cage Tilt With Bulldogs

County Champions Defeat Parochial Champs 27 to 22.

Seconds, Barons Win

Coach Payne's Bulldogs, County basketball champions, defeated St. Bernard's of Breda, parochial school champions, in a special attraction at the Manning High gym, Friday evening, 29 to 22.

In a curtain raiser the Manning Junior High defeated the Breda 2nd team 18 to 8 while the Black

Barons won over the Halbur Merchants in the last of the three game program, 27 to 22.

Manning High's victory over Breda was none too impressive, due to the fact that the Bulldogs failed to click in the manner in which they have in recent games. Their passing and basket shooting was not up to par and it was only exceptional shooting in spurts that kept the Bulldogs in front. Breda, too, although playing a better brand of ball than in the tournament, had considerable difficulty in finding the basket and also in working the ball down the floor.

Schelldorf's spectacular shooting kept Manning well in the lead during the last half, although that margin was often cut to several points by Polking, Breda's sharpshooting forward.

Manning held a 12 to 9 lead at the half and as the second period opened increased the lead to 21 to 12. Schelldorf was "right" and was capable of sinking his shots from just about anywhere. West, with two baskets and a free throw, completed the scoring in the last half. Schelldorf was high man with 15 points while West was second with 7. Polking was high man for the loser with 9 points.

Manning showed exceptional ability in sinking free throws, making 7 out of 8 attempts.

Manning will play Shelby in the first round of the sectional meet at Avoca this evening at nine o'clock.

Twelve Junior High cagers had some part to play in their victory over the Breda seconds, 18 to 8. Breda was held without a field goal in the first half while Manning held a ten to three count at the intermission. Breda cut this margin 10 to 8 before Manning began to click again. Two shots by **Russell Lathrop** and a pair by Hunter placed the Junior high squad well in the lead in the final quarter and Coach Harold Crawford sent in every man on the bench before the fray ended. **Lathrop was high man with three baskets** while Kenneth Esser, Bill Hunter and Robert Hoffmann connected for two each. Others to see action were Merle Curtis, Wayne "Pedro" Schrum, Winford Doug Rogers, Burton Schrum, Gene Claussen, Lyle Arp, Doug Jaeger and Francis Zerwas.

In the last game, the Black Barons defeated Halbur 28 to 21. Manning took an early lead in the game and maintained it the entire way, Max Struve and Heinz Detlefsen sinking shots from the corners whenever they needed a few points, Manning held a decided advantage in height and had little trouble in working the ball through the Halbur defense.

The count at the half was Manning 12 and Halbur 8. Max Struve was high point man for the winners with five field goals with Dale Bingham next with 7 points.

The Manning lineup consisted of Heinz Detlefsen and Max Struve at forwards; **C. Barten** **Can't be Clarence who graduated in 1930** at center and Dale Bingham and Randall Petersen at guards.

Top Double-header To Wall Lake Quint On Winners' Court.

The Manning Bulldog varsity failed by one point to overcome a 15 to 5 first half handicap Harlan Friday evening and were nosed out by the tall Shelby County five, 22 to 21. Coach Joe Roger's basketeers could not get going the first half either on defense or offense and the Harlan's team rolled up a comfortable lead.

However, the last half was all Manning and the Bulldogs picked up 16 points to the winners' 7 but it was not enough to overcome the big handicap.

Heinz Detlefsen at guard, was the outstanding man on the Manning team, accounting for 11 points, making a good share of them from all out on the large court. Kenneth Esser also found his range in the last half and was good for six points at close range. G. Christensen, Harlan center, led the winners attack with 12 points.

Billie Hunter, Manning forward was out of the game with the exception of a few minutes, due to a sprained ankle, caused by a fall on the ice Friday afternoon. Harold Nickum, a freshman reserve, played in his place. The Manning lineup consisted of Kenneth Esser, Harold Nickum and Billie Hunter at forwards, Robert Hoffmann at center and Heinz Detlefsen, Randall Petersen and Amos Misselhorn at the guard posts. The second team game was as thrilling and close as the main attraction, Harlan winning in two overtime periods, 17 to 16. **Russell Lathrop, Manning forward, was high man for the losers with 9 points.** Included in the local lineup were Gene Claussen and Donald Schrum at forwards; Harold Nickum and Richard Ohm at center and Amos Misselhorn and Lyle Arp at guards.

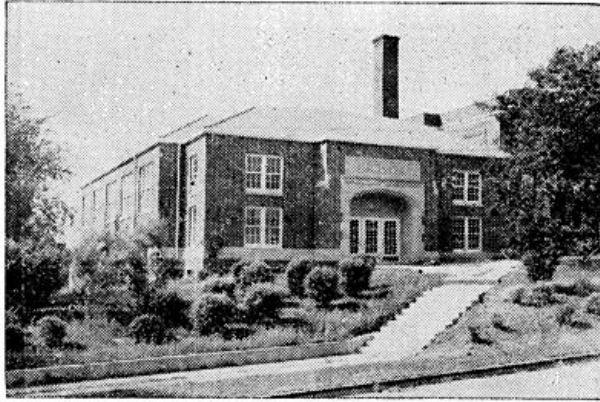

Carroll High's Tiger cagers found sweet revenge for last year's defeat at their school dedication by spoiling Manning's dedication here Friday night with a 25 to 22 victory over Coach Joe Roger's Bulldogs.

A tall scrappy visiting quint, the best team to represent Carroll in several years, played a too consistent game of ball both on defense and offense, to win the battle, going at top speed all the way.

The Bulldogs jumped into a 4 point lead in the first minutes of play as the result of Lyle Arp's long shots from near mid floor. After that Arp was so closely guarded he seldom got set for a shot. With Thorpe and Andersen taking long shot rebounds off the board, Carroll knotted the count and for the remainder of the hard-fought game there was seldom more than two or three points between the seams.

Carroll forged into a 22 to 16 lead in the final quarter as the result of some nice ball handling and the Bulldogs were unable to cut the lead. Apparently the Losers were over anxious in the last quarter and although getting many shots at the basket, were unable to connect. Manning's chief difficulty was in getting through the visitors defense. The visitors forced the Bulldogs to resort to long shots, most of which failed to find the net. In a curtain raiser Friday evening, Coach John Hall's scrappy Junior High ball hawks, came from behind to beat the Carroll Juniors 11 to 9 in a well-played game. The Junior

Hoffmann was high point man with 10 while Arp followed with 5. Anderson was high man for the winners with 10 points.

As a part of the dedication ceremonies, R.M. Kuebler, representing Mayor Neu of Carroll, shot a free throw and was followed by Manning's Mayor Enenbach whose shot fell short.

Manning will play Harlan at Harlan Friday night, Wall Lake at Wall Lake Monday evening and will play a conference game with Coon Rapids here next Thursday night, December 23rd.

Manning High nosed out a stubborn Glidden quint in a Coon Valley Conference basketball game here Tuesday evening to remain undefeated in conference competition.

The veteran Glidden five were in the running all the way and came to within one point of the Bulldogs in the final quarter. With but 4 minutes left to play, the Bulldogs were leading 19 to 18.

Coach Rogers' five sported a 12 to 5 lead at the half time as the result of a short scoring spree late in the second quarter. Another spurt in the final period enabled the winner to claim the contest. Both teams missed many shots, particularly under the basket. The Bulldogs worked the ball in for short shots in a better manner than in the Carroll game but their passing was ragged and at times wild.

The starting lineup for Manning consisted of Ohm and Arp at guards, Hoffmann at center and Schrum and Hunter at forwards. Esser and Misselhorn also saw service. Manning took the second team game 18 to 9. The Junior High team played a greater share of the second team game and outplayed their bigger rivals. However, the second string played for a quarter to run up a considerable lead, and then the Junior High five finished the contest.
