His teammates lost through graduation were Bob Koch, Leo Rostermundt, Jim Farrell, Dick Geith, Royce Rowedder and Willis Lohmeier. Four lettermen abetting the cause with Bohnsack are Danny Peters, Jerry Knaack and, LeRoy Kienast. The latter three were first string reserves and mainstays on the second team last year.

An idea of what his starting lineup this season will be was used by Coach Stenecker at Sioux City last Saturday when his boys defeated Galva 29-20 in the Morningside college clinic game. Forwards were Peters and Kienast, Knaack at center, and Leo Rostermundt, returned Army Veteran, playing guard post besides Bohnsack.

George Doyel and Delores Hammer were crowned king and queen of the seniors Tuesday evening at the annual junior-senior banquet, highlight of the school's social activities. The banquet, served at the Legion hall by the auxiliary, followed a Hawaiian theme.

Entrance to the hall was covered with white lattice and huge bouquets of lilacs were arranged in the entrance. Door to the main hall was flanked by palm trees. Blue crepe paper streamers formed an arch representing the sky, studded with silver stars and a large moon. A scenic mural was hung on the south wall of the auditorium, with a Hawaiian guitar player and Hula dancer placed near a grass hut. The entire scene was enclosed with red, white, yellow, and green crepe paper streamers.

Guests dined at four long tables, which were centered with blue streamers upon which were small boats and sand islands with palm trees. Tables were lighted by red and green and yellow tapers, on wooden pedestals.

Programs were in the shape of pineapples, and place cards showed a small lake with palm trees and sea shells upon the shore. Nutcups were small blue huts.

Locals Rip In Opener

Unwrapping an offense that exposed a lot of variable power, Manning came through its initial 1950 gridiron test on the home field Friday night to hand the Audubon Wheelers a 26-13 whipping in a crowd-pleasing Coon Valley conference affair.

The Bulldogs began an aggressive attitude relying mostly on their aerial offensive in the early stages of the game. As play progressed, however, land forces began operating and there were uncorked some surprising abilities among the ranks.

Touchdowns by Stan Frahm on a pass and Leonard Ramsey over the line gave Manning a 13-0 half-time margin that was never threatened. Allan Joens scored twice in the third and fourth to end the touchdown tabulating for the night.

Audubon's first crossing in the third came after Wayne Hansen intercepted a Manning pass and rambled 45 yards, and in the last stanza Larry Cronk scored from 19 yards out with Douglas Magnussen converting on a pass from Dean Cramer.

Coach Bill Steneker's lads were playing a nice brand of ball for the season's first game. Their alertness enabled them to recover two first-half fumbles that proved costly to the Wheelers. Hard contact and a lot of good blocking was noted on every play as a generous number of boys saw action. As a whole, assignments were well carried out.

With 50 per cent of their pass attempts clicking for yardage, the Bulldogs mixed their offense generously in the second half and unleashed some power that had been held under wraps. The diminutive backs for Manning gave some exhibitions of ball toting that promised greater things as the season progresses.

After a see-saw battle in the first period, with the aggressive edge going to Manning, the locals cut loose for pay dirt when Roger Nielsen flipped a 7-yard pass to Stan Frahm for the crossing, the conversion try failed. Later that same stanza Leonard Ramsey, from his fullback spot, plowed through a hole made by Bob Genzen and tallied from the three. Frahm snared a flipper pass from Nielsen to convert for 13-0 count.

In the third, Deanes Rowedder was middle-man on a forward from Frahm and lateral to Allan Joens who scored on the play covering 15 yards. Concluding scoring was Allan

Joens who recovered an Audubon fumble on the 35 and crossed. Ramsey plunged for the extra point.

Scoring by the visitors included the gift touchdown tallied by Wayne Hansen who intercepted a pass and went 45 yards. Larry Cronk scored in the last period from 19 yards out and Magnussen grabbed a pass from Cramer for the conversion.

The aerial work of Manning was good. Some precarious ball snatching was noted. Gary Nady probably held onto the toughest heave of the night when he received in the center of two defenders for a nice gain. Stan Frahm gave examples of his ball toting ability several times and his lanky frame was hard for Audubon to stop without permitting yards gained.

Although outweighed across the line, all Manning boys who saw action in the forward wall gave good accounts of themselves. Bob Genzen more than upheld his duties and smeared a lot of visiting attempts in his area. Cramer and Miller carried the biggest load for Audubon's offense.

Outstanding singular playing was noted by all the boys across the line, including Michael Niehaus, Kenneth Graves, Donald Wegner, Allen Jensen, Charles Frank, Bob Hansen, Allen Vennink, Claus Bunz and Gene Kruse.

With an open date before their next encounter, Coach Stenecker and assistants have their hands full smoothing out the rough edges before Lake City comes here. The northerners are rated the "team to beat" in Coon Valley action this year and came through their first test Friday by whipping Pocahontas 19-0 in a Twin Lakes loop tiff.

October 12, 1950 Carroll Tigers Check Bulldogs

Wet Ground Held Manning Passing Threat Under Par

Lose Was First For Local Club This Year; Tigers Get Fourth Win

Intermittent showers before and during Friday night's inter-county gridiron classic at the county seat held Manning's most potent offensive weapon at a minimum as the Carroll Tigers handed the Bulldogs their first defeat of the season while they went on to register their fourth win in as many starts.

By scoring on a pass in the last seconds of the game, Manning was able to save itself a white-washing when the final tally on the board read 26-7.

Carroll's heavier ground attack was too much for Manning and even in dry weather the Tigers would probably have shown superiority over the Bulldogs as evidenced in statistics of the game.

Although outweighed and outmanned, the Bulldogs were a determined eleven and fought all the way. Carroll was out to stretch its winning side of the ledger and now has 21 wins to one in the last 26 years. There are three tie games in the series between Manning and the county seaters.

Carroll, halted through the first period, broke loose to score three touchdowns in the second quarter to hold a 20-0 advantage at the half. And just nine plays after the second half kickoff, Carroll manufactured another score to sew up the contest.

After the opening minutes of the third period, Manning took charge, rolling deep into Carroll territory twice, only to be turned back by alert Carroll interceptions as the aerial game backfired.

The Tigers marched to the 16-yard line midway in the first period, but a 15-yard holding penalty and an offside infraction stopped that threat.

Carroll's first scoring march originating from the Manning 37, started late in the opening quarter. The Tigers moved to the nine-yard stripe as the period ended. Gene Eifler plunged over from six yards out on the second play of the second quarter and Rich Bengfort plunged for the extra point.

Dale Bock recovered a Manning fumble on the Bulldogs' 29-yard line after the kickoff and on the first play. Merle Mapes broke over his own right side, reversed to the left side of the field and raced over untouched. Bill Reicks plunged for the point and it was 14-0.

The second play after the kickoff found Manning's Roger Nielsen taking to the air, but a beautiful interception by Mapes gave Carroll the ball on its own 46.

Set back three five-yard penalties made the third goal-ward rush more difficult, but the Bengals came through on a 59-yard drive, with Bengfort palming to Eifler for the last 13 yards.

Carroll struck back fast and furious in the third quarter. Taking the kickoff on the 30, Bock brought it back to the 43. Reicks, Mapes and Eifler picked up successive first downs on runs of 10, 16 and 11 yards, moving the ball to the 20.

Reicks got seven and Mapes five for another first down, the Bengals fourth in five running plays. Reicks was held to a yard and Bengfort's pass to Mapes slipped through his outstretched fingers. Reicks bulled his way for five to the two and scored on the next play, fourth down, for a 26-0 score.

Manning, using passes except for a 17-yard sprint by Deanes Rowedder, moved to the Carroll seven-yard line for a first down midway in the third quarter. Leonard Ramsey picked up three yards to the four, but his first passing effort of the year found Bengfort intercepting on the goal line and bringing it back to the Carroll 33.

Dick Zerwas pounced on a Carroll fumble on the 32 and again the Bulldogs marched goal-ward. Working from the Tigers 14, Nielsen's pass was intercepted by Reicks on the eight and he brought it back to the 36 as the period ended.

A fumble on a fourth down punt attempt gave Carroll the ball on the Manning 14-yard line in the fourth quarter. Bud Baumhover picked up 12 yards to the two, then got one before Manning took over on a fumble.

With the clock running out, Nielsen passed 27 yards to Rowedder from deep in the end zone. Stan Frahm completed one for 10 yards for another first and ten. With a second remaining on the clock, Manning took advantage of a break to go 68 yards to score. Rowedder passed toward End Gary Nady. He deflected the ball into the waiting arms of Nielsen, who ran the remaining 50 yards to score untouched after time had run out as the ball was mapped. Ramsey plunged for the extra point to make the 26-7 final score.
