Bulldogs Split With Wall Lake

Manning High Bulldogs finished 1937-38 basketball season on the home court Friday night by splitting a doubleheader with Wall Lake in two well-played games. It was a non-conference game. The fast-breaking, sharp-shooting visitors counted twice from out in the court on their first two attempts and were leading 5 to 0 soon after the opening gun. However, the Bulldogs settled down, knotted the count and then went into a 1 point lead, holding the visitors well in check on defense. At the half Manning was leading 11 to 9.

Manning increased the lead 12 to 9 as the 3rd quarter started. The visitors knotted the count at 14 to 14 and the rest of the game was nip and tuck. With two minutes remaining the score was 19 to 19. Mack, flashy Wall Lake forward was fouled as he shot, the basket was good and he made good a free throw to give the visitors a 22 to 19 lead. Another foul on Manning gave the winners another

point and the game ended with Manning peppering their own net without any success.

Both teams played good ball and the game was exceptionally fast. Lyle Arp, who did a good job watching Mack, was fouled out soon after the second half started. While in the game he was good for 7 points, 2 baskets the result of long shots from mid-floor.

Early in the season the Bulldogs were swamped by Wall Lake 52 to 18.

The second string spotted the visitors a 4 point lead and then went on to win 13 to 8 in their best performance of the season.

Manning's Future Farmer team defeated Denison 19 to 4 in a curtain raiser.

Manning will play Manilla at 9:30 this evening at Denison in the first round of the Sectional meet. The winner of this game will play the winner of the Denison-Charter Oak game at 7:30 Saturday night in the class A finals.

March 3, 1938

F.F.A. Chapter Is Initiated

On Wednesday evening, March 2, the Manning Chapter of Future Farmers of America went to Carroll. Included in the group were the basketball players, ping-pong players and all of the officers.

Officers had to be initiated from a Green Hand to a Future Farmers because officers are required to be Future Farmers. For this procedure certain qualifications must be met.

The candidates were blindfolded and were bid to enter the room. Upon entering they met four obstructions: Ignorance, Waste, Indolence and Isolation. Future Farmer Group Is Busy With Projects

On March 22, the F.F.A. chapter of Manning held a meeting. Lyle Arp gave a report of the program committee and Wesley Lage gave a report of the Constitution committee. The reports were read and approved by the members. It was decided to have one member write up his project and put it in the Monitor each week.

These students in the Manning Smith-Hughes course of vocational agriculture are required to have a project. Some of them are very interesting and the success realized by these lads reflects on their work in the school course.

The following is the first of a series to be written by the students in this course.

My F.F.A. SWINE PROJECT

To start my Project I obtained 3 tried Purebred Hampshire sows to insure a larger litter of pigs and excellent sucking ability.

I then got these sows into good flush by the process known as flushing, that is feeding them an extra amount of concentrates from a well balanced ration, bringing them into good flush for breeding which has a direct influence on the number of pigs to the litter. Flushing certainly gave good results as the first sow had 16 pigs in her litter. I am expecting to get a letter any day now from Secretary Henry Wallace saying that I am reviving the swine industry with over-production.

I also find that feeding a well balanced ration has a big affect on the size and strength of pigs born.

Twenty-four hours before the sow farrowed I cut her feed in half and washed off all dirt and worm eggs from her udder (this is to keep the pigs from being infested with worms). After farrowing I gave her only a light ground oat slop for the first day and then gave her a handful of corn the first time. Then I added an additional handful of corn each feeding and some tankage as to have her on full feed in 7 or 8 days after farrowing.

To guard against anemia (thumps) I bought 1 lb. of copperas and mixed it with one gallon of warm water and painted this solution with a clean brush on the sows udder once a day until the pigs were 2 weeks old. I also put a clean piece of sod in the pen for the pigs to nose every other day.

Up until the pigs were two weeks old I fed each an eye dropper full of cod-liver oil once a day. This certainly made a difference in the growth of the pigs - at 3 weeks of age one pig weighed 17 lbs.

I am going to put these pigs on clean ground and feed them a well-balanced ration and hope to sell them before the market breaks in the fall.

George Opperman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Emil Opperman, a senior student in the Vocational Agriculture Department at Manning High was named one of the outstanding boys in the Future Farmers of America organization at their state convention held last Thursday and Friday at Hotel Savery in Des Moines. George was awarded the "Iowa Farmer" degree, one of fifty-six presented to a field of over 4,000 vocational agriculture students. In the final game, Manning poured baskets in from all corners in the opening minutes to lead 14 to 5 at the first quarter. The half ended 18 to 5.

Teams entered were Denison, Carroll, Lake City, Exira, Manilla, Castana and Manning.

Manning F.F.A. team has not been defeated this season.

By winning the meet they have the privilege of representing Northwest Iowa in the next tourney.

Manning High dropped its first conference game of the regular season's schedule at Glidden Friday night, 28 to 26 in an overtime. Coach Hall's quint started strong and looked like sure winners in the early stages of the game and led at the half 12 to 6. Manning High Bulldogs continued their winning streak in games during the past few days with well earned victories over the strong Emerson quintet, 22 to 15 and over last year's conference champions, Lake City, 25 to 12. These wins keep Jack Hall's red and black cagers in the undefeated class and also at the head of their conference thus far in the season. A record crowd, the largest to witness a single feature in the history of the new gym, jammed the building Friday night to watch Manning hand Emerson a 22 to 15 setback in the Bulldog's best effort of the season. Emerson, boasting one of the best teams in southwestern Iowa, gave the Bulldogs their best competition of the season but were unable to compete with the clever playing Bulldogs on either offense or defense. McKee, rangy center for the visitors had little opportunity for tip-ins, although he did get a couple.

Emerson dropped in the first basket a second after the opening whistle but at the quarter the Bulldogs were out in front 6 to 2 and went on a scoring spree in the second quarter to lead 16 to 7 at intermission. The visitors outscored the Bulldogs in the final half 8 to 6 but were unable to close the gap, losing their second game in 14 starts.

Manning did not substitute during the fray, Richard Ohm at center, Harold Nickum and Wayne Schrum at the forwards and James Rowedder and Lyle Arp at the guards, going the route. National convention held in conjunction with the Livestock Show. The first three named will make up the Livestock judging team and the latter two the Poultry Judging team. These two groups won the right to compete with teams from approximately forty states by virtue of winning first place in the state contests held in recent weeks.

Bob Kruse, local F.F.A. president and Kenneth Keat, vice-president may make the trip also through the courtesy of Dr. and Mrs. Wilhite who are driving to Kansas City at that time. The group will leave Sunday and will return about Thursday. Judging will be Monday and Tuesday. The judging teams will make the trip on the Milwaukee railroad, having been given transportation as a company award for their showing.

Another state championship team from Manning High, the Crops Judging team, which won state honors recently at Ames and with it the right to represent Iowa at the International Livestock show in Chicago, received a hard blow this week

when informed it could not compete in the national meet. The ruling on this matter is that a team once competing in a National contest will not be eligible to compete in another. It so happens that the Crops team is composed of Alvin and Merlin Musfeldt and George Opperman and Amos Kusel. The first three in this group compose the Livestock team and thus are disqualified for the Chicago contest.

Monona County, winner of second place, will probably represent Iowa. The Monona County team which is from Whiting, Iowa, started out under Mr. Campbell who taught there before coming to Manning.

Pictured above is Bob Kruse with his Market Litter of 9 Poland China hogs. Last year Bob had a litter of hogs in with his dad's which was not so satisfactory. So last fall his dad, William J. Kruse, said Bob could have his hogs separate this year if he had to keep them in the parlor. As a result, this year, Bob had an ideal setup for raising hogs. They were on a red clover pasture which had never had hogs before. There was an oiler for mange control, and a temporary shelter for shade.

The pigs were watered with a barrel waterer, and they were self-fed, corn, protein and mineral. They also received an oats slop.

The pigs did very well as they reached 216 pounds at the age of 5 1/2 months. Bob sold them at a profit of \$57.93. This was very good as Bob had a high vaccination cost due to the fact that his father's hogs contracted erysipelas and Bob had to vaccinate for both it and cholera. The pigs were sold for \$7.40 per hundred, and were raised at a total cost of \$4.63 per hundred. This includes the loss on the sow.

Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Wilhite were going to the Royal at Kansas City and kindly offered to take the two future farmer delegates along. While the two boys were there they attended two sessions of the convention. Attending the convention were delegates and officers from all parts of the country; the president being from Maine and the first Vice president from Hawaii.

The president and another state officer acted as delegates from every state. The total membership of Future Farmers now stands at 207,000 which is an increase of 50,000 over last year.

The convention was held in the Municipal Auditorium which was a block square and four stories high.

The room in which the convention was held is the same room in which the national collegiate basketball tournament is held.

Some of the more interesting things about some of the states were that Texas was the largest, having five-hundred chapters and that Wisconsin paid thirty-one dollars per chapter for expenses to help pay for the trip to Kansas City, for the judging teams and delegates.

The American farmers are selected from the 40 or more state degree farmers and the 166 boys selected were the outstanding boys of the 207,000 in America. The Kansas City Star picks one boy out of these National Champions and calls him the star farmer and award him a prize of \$500. To be eligible for the American farmer degree the boy must be outstanding in leadership, projects and have a high scholastic record.

One of the most interesting things about the convention was the meeting of boys from other states and comparing their projects with your own. In Texas the boys used cotton as their main project and in Boston, truck farming was a big factor. Roger Eich, Reporter.

These boys competed in the high school section against schools from all over the state for honors in what is said to be the biggest show in the history of the Congress.

When the final report of the judges was made, Manning was announced as winner of the State Championship in the Poultry section, the team consisting of Billy Meggers and Leonard Frahm. These two youngsters compiled the highest score of any high school team in this division, and Billy Meggers registered 825 points to top the state in individual scoring.

This team judged poultry in 9 classes: 5 in production, 2 in exhibition and 2 in meat.

By winning first place in the state this team claimed the privilege to represent Iowa at the National meet at Kansas City next month.

The dairy team, consisting of Kenneth Keat, Sheldon Book and Roy Struve, rated about tenth in the Waterloo show. Keat placed first in the individual standings in the Ayrshire section and Book 1st in the Brown Swiss.

In addition to honors received at the contests, the Milwaukee Railroad offers passes to the Kansas City convention as a further educational award. The passes are awarded according to certain points established by the company and they go to winners whose home town is on the Milwaukee Railroad. Mr. Campbell received word yesterday that all his state championship boys on both the livestock and poultry teams would probably receive the passes.
