Bulldogs Win Coon Valley Cage Tourney

In a thrill-packed, hard-fought, fast-played battle, Bill Steneker's Bulldogs defeated a powerful Audubon basketball team in the final, round of the Coon Valley cage tournament, here last night, 30-28 before one of the biggest crowds to ever jam into the local gym. Audubon, regarded one of the top teams in this section of the state, and Manning, unbeaten this season, gave one of the most exciting exhibitions of basketball witnessed on the Bulldog court in several seasons. Audubon, by its performance the previous two nights had been rated by many as favorites and hundreds of their fans were present to back them up. However, when the chips were down, the Bulldogs came through to out-drive and out-fight their rivals to take the fast though clean-played game.

The Steneker men trailed 12-6 at the first quarter as Audubon rolled along on a smooth-working offense. The picture changed in the second quarter as the Bulldogs set the pace to lead at the intermission, 18 to 16. At the three-quarter mark the score was knotted at 22-22. Bedlam broke loose in the final quarter with both teams setting a terrific pace. With a few short minutes to go and the score tied 26-26, Wiese dropped in a short shot and Lake tipped in a follow-up. Audubon scored with less than a minute to go and Manning on taking the ball, held position until the final gun.

Clemensen with 9 points paced the losers and Jim "Bud" Schrum with 7 and Don Mohr with 7 were high for Manning. Bulldog scoring was quite evenly divided with Verne Koch getting 6, Robert Lake and Sam Wiese 4, Don Neal 2. The entire Manning squad played one of the best games of the year in turning in this splendid victory.

Glidden 28, Lake City 13

Glidden completely outclassed a scrappy Lake City five in the consolation round 28 to 13.

H. Gross with 12 points was high for the winners and Squires with 6 was high for the losers.

Mr. Baker of Glidden, Secretary of the conference presented checks instead of trophies, to the winning teams.

Tournament officials were Verne Helm of Logan and J.J. O'Connor of Wiota.

Manning will play Harlan here next Tuesday evening and Irwin there next Friday night, both non-conference games.

An upset marked the opening round of the Coon Valley tournament here Monday evening when Lake City, loser in every conference value this season knocked off Coon Rapids, one of the top, seeded teams, 19 to 17.

Glidden 31, Bayard 23

The luckless Bayard quint dropped a colorless affair to Glidden in the opening game 31 to 23 after trailing at the half by a single point. 14-13 Rudi topped the winners with 10 points while Boots led the losers with 6.

Audubon 29, Scranton 13

An underdog Scranton five fell victim to the power of the vaunted Audubon Wheelers In the second game, 29 to 13 but only after the losers had given a strong battle. Audubon led at the quarter 5-4 and stretched that margin to 15-6 at the half time. The winners did not look quite up to par although winning without too much trouble as they throttled Scranton's offense. McLaughlin with 11 points led the winners while McClurg, Thornton and Duff collected four each for the losers.

Lake City 19, Coon Rapids 17

The feature game of the evening was Coon Rapids defeat by Lake City 19-17. Lake City grabbed an early lead and maintained it all the way, warding off a last minute rally to win by a 2-point margin. Lake City lead at the half 11-8 and 19 to 12 going into the last quarter. In the final quarter Coon scored 5 points while the winners were held scoreless.

Sharyek with 6 points paced the winners while D. Blanchard and Bowers scored 5 each to lead the losers.

Manning 34, Manilla 14

In the final game of the night, Manning put on a fine exhibition to top a stubborn Manilla quint, 34 to 14. Scoring was well divided with Jim Schrum leading the parade with 9, followed by Don Mohr with 8, Ken Jensen 6 and Sam Wiese and Verne Koch 4 each.

The Bulldogs led 21-7 at the half and Coach Stenecker substituted freely in the last period. Eberle and James with 4 points each were high for Manilla.

Audubon had little difficulty in disposing of Glidden In the first game of the second round Tuesday night, 34 to 18.

The early stages of the game were played on quite even terms as Glidden connected for several shots and Audubon had some difficulty in finding the net. However, as the game progressed, Audubon power began to tell and the Wheelers won going away.

Chard paced the winners with 12 points while Rudi was high for Glidden with 5.

Manning 37, Lake City 29

Manning High encountered stronger opposition than they had anticipated in turning back the Lake City entry. Early in the season, Manning trounced Lake City 51-16 with comparative ease, but Tuesday night's game, was a different story with the Bulldogs trailing until midway in the third quarter when they knotted the count at 19 all after trailing at the half way mark 18-14.

Manning players were unable to hit the net with any regularity whatever and this coupled with the fact the visitors connected on several long shots, was enough to

give Lake City the edge for nearly three-quarters. The Bulldogs hit their stride in the final period and led 37-29 at the gun.

Many fouls marked the game. Lake City was chalked up with 18 and Manning with 11. The losers lost three regulars via the foul route in the first half.
